Install a VMM and a Linux distro

In this assignment, each of you will install a free virtual machine manager (VMM) and then a Linux distribution (distro). This will give you experience installing and configuring the Linux operating system. Having a VMM installed on your machine will enable you to install and run other operating systems in the future.

Teamwork to install the VMM and Linux distro

Work together with your teammates to install a VMM, either VirtualBox or VMware Workstation Player, on each of your machines. Then each of you should choose a different Linux distro, and you can work together to install the chosen distro from its .iso file into the VMM on each machine.

- VirtualBox (runs on Windows, Mac, and Linux): <u>https://www.virtualbox.org</u>
- VMware Workstation Player (runs on Windows and Linux): <u>https://www.vmware.com/in/products/workstation-player/workstation-player-evaluation.html</u>
- Linux distros: Google "Linux distros"

Run the Linux distro

On each machine, run the chosen Linux distro and <u>make a screenshot</u> that clearly shows the distro running in a window of the host OS (Mac or Windows) under the control of the VMM. See the example screenshots.

Tips

Do not give the guest operating system (the Linux distro) more than half of your physical machine's cores or main memory. Doing so will cause serious performance problems.

The default virtual disk size is small – often only 10 GB. You might want to give it more, say 32 or 64 GB. After the distro has been installed, it won't be easy to change the disk size.

During the installation of the Linux distro, the installer will prompt you to answer many questions (username, password, etc.). You may be asked if you want to allow the installer to completely erase your disk. The installer is referring to the <u>virtual</u> disk, not your physical disk. Answer "yes".

What to submit
